Engaging Culturally & Linguistically Diverse (CALD) Communities in Health Research

An ongoing concern for health and medical researchers and the general community is the documented underrepresentation of CALD participants in research and clinical trials. The inclusion of CALD communities in health research is extremely vital to achieve equitable outcomes. Addressing obstacles and barriers of targeting CALD participation in research requires a multistrategic approach.

Literature reviews, research and community consultations has identified some barriers to CALD inclusion in research. The Engaging CALD Communities in Health Research has pulled together some of the perceived key barriers and corresponding enablers that you may want to consider as part of the planning process for your research project.

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Scholarship opportunity!

A PhD Scholarship is available for increasing awareness about organ donation and registration on the Australian Organ Donor Register (AODR) with young adults in diverse communities.

This is an exciting opportunity to conduct research in partnership with NSW Organ and Tissue Donation Service (SESLHD), Organ and Tissue Steering Committee (SWSLHD), the Shrimad Rajchandra Mission Dharampur (Australia) spiritual organisation and the University of Melbourne. The project will be suited to individuals from a range of disciplines and offering the opportunity to engage with industry experts and inform practice and policy. The successful candidates will receive a scholarship of \$29,863 (tax-free) p.a for 3 years, as well as a tuition fee waiver.
