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Consumer Reps Assisting with Surveys

The Patient Experience Tracker about how care is being (PETs) has been used as part of the Care of Confused Hospitalised Older Persons programme(CHOPs). We at Fairfield hospital are continuously trying to improve question. All responses are standards of our service to all our consumers and rely on feedback to implement improvements. PETs have being used to find

out views about the care provided at Fairfield Hospital. The information collected will then be used to improve our services to carers and patients in our care.

CBORD and Menu Changes

Why are these changes happening?

We are transitioning to Health Share CBORD database as required by NSW Health. The new 2 weeks menu cycle will continue to provide diets that meet the Agency for Clinical Innovation (ACI) Nutrition Standards. We are also revising our diet order names to bring them in line with the ACI Diet Specifications for adults and paediatric patients

When are these changes happening? The project is happening in 2 stages 26 August and 22 September is the Go-Live Date.

What will we need to do about it?

The Ward Dietitian will be training Nursing staff and Ward Clerks about the changes to diet names and the new menu. Training of nursing will be rolled out in September.

All Dietetic staff will need to attend training with Health Share on the new CBORD database. Training dates in September are being organised.

New WiFi technology for meal ordering

After Go-Live, as WiFi becomes available we will change from using

paper menu or palm pilot to WiFi tablets. This means the meal selection will be downloaded from patient's bedside to the CBORD database straight away.

Pre-Package Meals

We will be using pre-package meals for texture modified diet. These will help improve the variety of texture modified diet including more vegetarian options. However, they still can't self-select their meals at the moment.

New Food Items

There have been new food items added to our menu over the past months to try and help minimise changes where possible for Go-Live. For example: Omelette, Falafel, Nuggets, Salmon Patties etc..

We will also be adding some new kidfriendly foods to our paediatric menu although that is still to be confirmed. Parents of patients above 1 year of age will be able to select the meals for their child once we Go-Live.

The Network during the meeting had the opportunity to meet Fairfield's new Graduate Health ManagementTrainee Benjamin Kalmar, who will be with us for a period of 3 months before moving onto District Human Resources. Special guest this month was Victoria Knol - Patient Safety Manager. Ms Knol provided the Network with an overview of her role which is essentially patient safety and how the Integrated Incident Management System (IIMS) works. She advised the Network that everyone has access to IIMS and any incident that occurs on Hospital grounds needs to be reported in IIMS, investigated and monitored until an outcome or conclusion is reached. General Manager Arnold Tammekand also provided an extensive update about the hospital and concluded with an invitation to a Christmas Party in early

December at Smithfield RSL Club. The Annual Consumer & Community Participation Conference will be held on Friday 6 November 2015 at the Liverpool Catholic Club.

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Quality Awards

The 2015 South Western Sydney Local Health District (SWSLHD) Patient Safety Seminar was held at Liverpool Hospital on Thursday 13 August 2015.

At the seminar, the quality awards were announced.

Congratulations to the Fairfield General Practice (GP) Unit who were the winners of Category 5 — Integrated Health Care.

Their project titled "Improved Integration of Cancer Services and GP's" was aimed to improve communication between Specialists and GPs by reducing the time to produce a specialist letter from an average of 19 days to less than 7 days.

The project aimed to make cancer care more seamless in South Western Sydney by improving communication to GPs. A rigorous qualitative research project

interviewed 22 GPs to explore ways to make cancer care more seamless. From the issues identified , a letter delay was worked on. An expert group processed mapped letter production, set aims, chose measures and identified change ideas. Rapid cycles implemented by a micro team reduced the delay in writing letters from an average 19 days to under 7 days. The joint governance of the project between the Fairfield GP Unit, The SWS Primary Health Care Network , SWSLHD Cancer Services and the Ingham Institute model a way forward for integrated quality improvement in the local health system.

The effective improvement cycle has been incorporated into the process systematising the improvements. The measure (dictation to approval) is being systematised and is becoming one of the suite measures used to monitor quality is SWS Cancer Services. These improvements are getting implemented in the Liverpool Cancer Treatment Centre with spread to other LHD treatment

- A Wound Specialist Team to consult, assess and manage wounds


