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Value Based Health Forum

The Value Based Health Care (VBHC) Forum was held on the 28 and 29 August 2019. The Forum focused on the VBHC strategy across the broader NSW health system and provided an opportunity for clinicians, Leading Better Value Care (LBVC) program leads and clinical leads to share with each other on successes and challenges with initiating and implementing LBVC initiatives. Danella Hackett, Senior Physiotherapist and Musculoskeletal Co-ordinator, who works in the Fairfield Orthopaedic Hip and Knee Service, was invited to speak on a panel with other expert clinicians and leading better value care program leads about improvement processes used in implementing LBVC initiatives, drawing on her expertise in osteoarthritis chronic care. Danella's role is vital in assessing and managing people awaiting joint replacement surgery, assisting patients to improve their chronic disease management and maximising their function whilst awaiting surgery. The discussion was well received and allowed clinicians to understand the enablers and challengers to implementing value based health care initiatives



Hand Therapy South Western Sydney

Hand injuries are common and one of the most frequent presentations to Emergency Departments. Most people don't realize until they experience a hand injury how much it can interfere with their ability to perform simple tasks like dressing, driving a car or participate in work. Hand Therapists at SWSLHD Hand Centre are highly skilled physiotherapists, their primary role is to help people regain normal hand function after injury, whether or not they require surgery.

The Hand Therapy team work closely with the multi-disciplinary team which also includes hand surgeons and nurses. The Hand Therapy service at Fairfield Hospital is a district wide service for SWSLHD. Although we are primarily based at Fairfield Hospital we also review inpatients at Liverpool Hospital and run a satellite Hand Therapy Clinic at Campbelltown Hospital.

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Be a F.A.S.T hero and fight stroke!





This year for Stroke Week 2019 the theme was "F.A.S.T Heroes". On Thursday 5 September Fairfield Hospital held a stroke awareness event to raise community awareness about stroke and to recognise the early warning signs and symptoms of a stroke using the F.A.S.T acronym. Raising awareness about F.A.S.T will ensure that stroke sufferers get to a hospital in time to receive lifesaving treatment.

The event featured guest speakers: Mr Colin Silk a stroke survivor, Stroke Life, Stroke Recovery NSW Association, Fairfield Allied Health team and SWSLHD Stroke CNC.

The Allied Health team held stroke education activities at their stall which was interactive and fun, this gained a lot of interest from the attendees. There was also an opportunity for attendees to have a free blood pressure check and a stroke risk assessment completed by a stroke nurse which 35 willing attendees took part in.

In addition, ILS, Vision Australia and Nestle had information stalls and representatives on hand to provide information and resources. Cello paper donated a gift voucher and provided resources. Also available were stroke resources from the National Stroke Foundation and the Heart Foundation.

The day was a huge success with great local community support and donations received. A BBQ lunch was supplied and prepared by Bunnings and seafood platters were provided by Zag Seafood. Gift vouchers were received from Woolworths, Zag Seafood, and a gift hamper from Priceline. To conclude the day a raffle was held and over \$300 was raised which will assist with the purchase of equipment for stroke patients.

Congratulations to Ashleigh Minchew (stroke champion) and Edalina Hondros (appreciation award) who were our two award recipients for 2019 for their commitment and dedication to stroke care.

Every 10 minutes an Australian will have a stroke which will have an impact on their life. Stroke is largely preventable and several risk factors can be controlled. Community awareness of F.A.S.T, time critical treatment available and local community support is vital. So, let's continue to work together to fight stroke and save lives.
