

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#EndPJParalysis

The Nursing Staff at Fairfield Hospital have pledged to #EndPJparalysis in 2018.

In November 2017 Prof Brian Dolan held a workshop for South Western Sydney Local Health District (SWSLHD) to explain the social movement taking place in health care facilities in the UK & New Zealand.

The premise is simple — we will be encouraging the use of street clothes in hospital and not pyjamas in an effort to get patients up and moving as quickly as possible.

Supporting patients with getting up, getting dressed, eating, drinking and moving leads to greater independence and enhanced wellbeing whilst in hospital.

It is a surprising statistic that 10 days of bed rest in hospital is equivalent to 10 years of muscle aging in people over 80 years of age and reconditioning after muscle wastage takes twice as long as this deconditioning.

Fairfield Hospital is very proud to be the first facility in the Local Health District (LHD) to embark on this for our patients.

Nursing staff wore Christmas PJs to work on Thursday 21 December 2017 to launch the programme for the next year and to understand what it feels like to be in pyjamas all day whilst trying to function normally.

Director of Nursing & Midwifery—Teresa Benetos said "I'm very proud to lead such a fabulous group of Nursing & Midwifery staff. The day of Brain Dolan Workshop run by the LHD everyone asked me to help make this happen and I'm committed to doing so."

Look out for more Pyjama themed days in 2018 as the initiative is rolled out across the facility.
