Fairfield Hospital on Wednesday 10 July celebrated NAIDOC Week 2019. It was a great day filled with stalls, sand circle performances, including the Buuju Buuju Dancers, the Urban Zenadth Kes Torres Strait Islander Dance Group and Katie Leslie from the Jannawi Dance Clan.

To complete the day an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander garden was officially opened to the community and staff. The garden sits proudly on the Fairfield Hospital grounds as a physical reminder of the cultural importance of Australia's Indigenous people. It was named Ngalawau "nagah-mi" which means to sit and dream in the local Aboriginal Darung language. The name was the highest voted amongst three options on the day by the community and staff.

A huge thank you to the Angel Feather Foundation for the enormous support, donation and dedication to make the garden happen in time for NAIDOC week.

Special mention to our community and consumer group who also came in support and recognition of the day.







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
Bossley Park High School students came in for a hospital tour on 19 June. The students had an

The theme for Sorry Day 2019 was "Walk Together with Courage"



With an emphasis on care and compassion, the District's Sorry Day Symposium at Liverpool Hospital showed the continuing impact of the Stolen Generations on our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. Smoking and sand ceremonies, keynote speakers and a panel discussion focused on healing, support and respect were held. The beautiful sand artworks will be displayed across the District.

Our Fairfield Aboriginal Liaison Officer (ALO) Katrina Sing was part of that panel discussion and said, "What an absolute honour it was to be able to participate in such an important event."

It was a very heavy yet wonderful Sorry Day event. There were strong and inspiring stories and important discussions that need to continue to be had. It's an important reminder that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health is everyone's business.

A happy graduating morning tea was held for the group where they were presented with certificates and show bags for successfully completing the 9 week program.

The group also received a small orientation about the Hospital Community & Consumer Participation Network which resulted in interest to join our network and represent our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community.

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The 2019 theme for Refugee Week was "A world of Stories" and at Fairfield Hospital we heard stories through student photographs.

The Mental Wellbeing Health Promotion Team in Partnership with NSW Refugee Service & Fairfield High School facilitated a 10 week Wellbeing Photovoice Program with Fairfield IEC students.

Photovoice is a method for communities to take photos which represent a theme. For Refugee Week it was the "Five Ways of Wellbeing".

On the 17th June, Fairfield Hospital hosted students and facilitators for a morning tea with the Hospital Executive team to talk about their photos and what it meant to them, with an opportunity to ask questions. The event concluded with a tour of the hospital.

The nine photographs gifted to the Hospital will be displayed proudly to show our diversity and welcoming of our emerging communities.



GESTATIONAL DIABETES | Fairfield's Hospital Clinical Nurse Diabetes Consultant Jenny Wright has introduced a smartphone app to manage blood glucose levels in gestational diabetes. The original pilot resulted in fewer clinic appointments and the ability to immediately address any abnormalities in patient blood glucose levels. "This app gives us real-time viewing to treat our mums-to-be," she said.

Next Jenny is about to pilot a non-English speaking study of the app which is very relevant for the Fairfield Community and our patients.
