OVERCOMING HURDLES OF A BRAIN INJURY

WALKING, talking, eating, sitting and breathing were all things Danny Li took for granted before almost losing his life.

"Although I can't recall what happened to me on my 20th birthday, I know that I almost lost my life," Mr Li said.

Some Liverpool Hospital doctors said his chances of recovery were slim, but Danny defied the odds by awakening from a coma he had been in for a month.

"I underwent major rehabilitation and slowly, with the help of the team at Liverpool Hospital and the support of my family and close friends, I slowly recovered," he said.

CASULA

Hefty fine for odometer tampering car dealer

AN UNLICENSED used car dealer has been ordered to pay \$31,762 for winding back the odometers on more than 10 cars he bought and then resold.

Jimmy Iskander, from Casula, copped the fine for tampering with the odometers on Toyotas and a Mercedes between 2010 and 2012 to boost the cars' resale values.

Parramatta Court heard in one instance Mr Iskander was able to double the resale price on a 2006 Toyota

Camry by winding the odometer back from 121,429km to 46,118km.

In another instance, the odometer on a 2004 Mercedes Benz sedan was wound back from 210,000km to just 91,000km.

NSW Fair Trading Commissioner Rod Stowe said Mr Iskander was lucky he wasn't given a jail term.

"Odometer tampering is a serious offence and creates significant detriment for consumers," Mr Stowe said.
