Parting gift to Fairfield ED

Thanks to the generosity of Sydney Baseball Lions Club former president Butch Chapman, Fairfield Emergency Department has received a \$38,000 V60 ventilation machine.

The benefit of Non Invasive Ventilation (NIV) is to enable ventilatory support without the need for intubation. NIV is pressure ventilation delivered as BiPAP (two levels of ventilatory support) known as inspired positive airway pressure (IPAP) and expired positive airway support (EPAP). The aim is to maintain adequate ventilation and minimise the effort of breathing. This piece of equipment is used on many patients that present with respiratory conditions that cause them to have difficulties breathing due to many conditions, most of all pulmonary oedema (fluid on the lungs).

Mr. Chapman died in September 2014 and is survived by his wife Chris. He had helped Fairfield Hospital raise money for many years and first proposed donating

the ventilation in early 2014.

The machine features a plaque in the memory of Mr. Chapman who Club Secretary Cathy McClure described him as a gentleman.

Donations and Bequests to Fairfield Hospital helps us provide an increasing range of services to our patients and over the years have been used to purchase equipment to ensure the ongoing quality of care provided to our patients.

Special Care Nursery Donation

Fairfield Hospital Special Care Nursery has received two new Rad 7 oximeters with neonatal sensors. A big thank you to the Humpty Dumpty Foundation for donating the two pieces of equipment worth \$8800. These machines are used to shine lights through babies fingers and toes and to measure the amount of oxygen in their blood vessels.

This ensures that oxygen is delivered to the baby during critical times and prevents damage to their brain, eyes, lungs and other organs.

The money for these two pieces of equipment was raised at the 2014 Great Humpty Dumpty Ball.

Fairfield Hospital would like to applaud the great efforts of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation for their support and ongoing commitment.

The Humpty Dumpty Ball has been running annually since 1990 with money raised to purchase over 34 pieces of medical equipment for 21 hospitals around the country,

EMERGO Exercise


On December 10 2014 an Emergo Exercise was scheduled to assess the facility Disaster and Critical Incident Health Plan. The purpose of the exercise was to measure the capacity and capability of clinical management, hospital capacity and communication channels with internal and external personnel.

There were five (5) departments that participated in the exercise, the Emergency Department, HDU, Pathology, Radiology and Theatre/Recovery along with the Hospital Control Centre response team. A total of 38 Fairfield staff members and 10 Emergo Instructors (from various hospitals and health services) participated in the exercise.

The presented exercise scenario was a gas explosion at Stocklands (Wetherill Park) where casualties presented with various injuries and conditions. Over 100 casualties were assessed and treated. The response and feedback received from participants, staff and instructors was overall positive. The report will be provided by the Emergo Exercise Coordinator in due time.
