The Burmese language is the official language of Myanmar (formerly known as Burma). The language utilizes the Burmese script, and derives from the Mon script, which ultimately comes from the Pali script.

Burmese is a tonal language, with four main tones; it is classified broadly into two categories. One is formal, used in literary works and official publications. The other is street, which is a language used with family and friends. There are various branches of Burmese spoken language, as well. One form is used when speaking to elders and teachers.
